“WHERE CIVIL DISCOURSE MEETS CIVIC ACTION” is the theme of The **Sandra Day O’Connor** home. The 1957 sun dried adobe and unplastered walls home is being relocated adjacent to the AHS Museum and will open in the fall of 2009. Originally designed and built by Justice O’Connor in Paradise Valley, she and husband John raised their children here while using the home to “hash out issues” within the government. People came together in this house, resolved disputes and reached compromises that made Arizona a better place to live. As a Historymaker from 1993, the Historical League is proud to see the continued preservation of the O’Connor home so near our Museum.



Nov 12 was the ceremonial “roof raising” of the project with dignitaries including **Tempe Mayor Hugh Hallman**, **The Honorable Jane Dee Hull** and Museum Director **Dr Peter Welsh** wearing hardhats with TV news crews taking photos.

“We want the O’Connor House to be known as a place where discussion leads to action,” said **Elva Coor** chairwoman of the committee. “The Historical Society is at the intersection of the past and future,” commented **Dr Peter Welsh**. “We bring the story of Arizona to the public and so the Arizona Historical Society Museum is proud to be the public gateway to the O’Connor House.

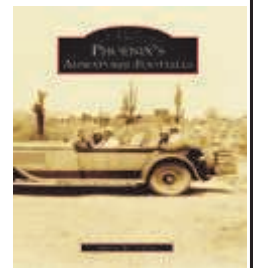



Ambassador Barbara Barrett Engages in Finland

When sworn in as the United States Ambassador to Finland **Barbara McConnell Barrett** faced a daunting challenge: building and strengthening the U.S. relationship with a nation that for centuries has been the site where East and West intersect. We asked Ambassador Barrett about her agenda. Here is her report of the first 5 months.

Most of my diplomatic attentions are directed to government and business issues important to the United States like energy, pharmaceutical patents, technology, Afghanistan, Kosovo, Russia's military action in Georgia, forestry and paper industry, etc. Much of my time is committed to duties inside the Embassy compound or with business or government leaders in or near Helsinki. Energy issues were a focus in the early summer because, as Finland is a nation that is dependent upon imported petroleum, oil prices have a big impact on its economy. As a

result, Finland has become a world leader in alternative fuels, bio fuels, fuel efficiency and clean fuels. Cooperation with the U.S. on research and development of this has been a key focus of the U.S. Embassy Helsinki.

This year Finland holds the rotating chairmanship of the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE). When Russian troops attacked Georgia and occupied the regions of South Ossetia and Abkhazia, the OSCE was called to action. Finland cooperates with NATO through its Partnership for Peace program. As a result, Finland is working with the Provincial Reconstruction Team in Mazar-e-Sharif, Afghanistan and in Kosovo, Chad and many other world hot spots.

In October, Finland played host to an historic meeting between top American military officer, **Admiral Mike Mullen** (the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff) and his Russian counterpart. Also, recently the USS Klakring, a Navy frigate, paid a call at the port of Helsinki, showing the American flag in a welcoming city. All of Finland celebrated the October announcement that former **Finnish President Martti Ahtisaari** had been selected to receive the Nobel Peace Prize.

Beyond the business inside the Embassy, it has been exciting to explore Finland outside of Helsinki. During Juhannus, the Finnish Midsummer celebration, I piloted a Cessna across Finland from south to north and back again — making six stops to visit Finnish communities and to learn about what drives the economy. This summer I also bicycled over 800 kilometers crossing Finland from west to east along the southern coast and then from east to west at the mid-section of the country. On my bicycle I visited saw mills, paper mills, power plants and refineries. I learned from my visits to technology centers and universities. I enjoyed stops to talk with owners of galleries, forests and farms. Without exception, Finns always greeted me warmly.

As a guest of the Finnish Air Force, I flew an F-18 Hornet. I white water rafted, ATVed, sailed, fished, hiked, swam, motorcycled, drove, trained and predictably rode horseback through some glorious countryside. Finland is home to seven UNESCO World Heritage sites, each of which I now have explored. From the military fortress of Suomenlinna to the Bronze Age burial site of Saimmallahtenmäki, the variety of these sites reinforces the historic and continuing significance of Finland.

Each day I am conscious of what a privilege it is to represent the people and the President of the United States of America in such an important world partner, Finland.

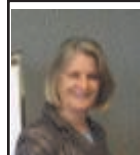

POLLY ROSENBAUM ARCHIVES AND HISTORY BUILDING The State Archives was created in 1937 as a result of the New Deal's WPA historical records survey. It holds the permanently valuable records of Arizona's state and local governments, a collection of rare and valuable books about Arizona, birth and death records, deeds and court records.

Polly Rosenbaum knew the importance of remembering the past. She worked tirelessly to ensure that state records were carefully preserved so that future generations could learn from them and remember the important lessons of the past. She was a vocal advocate for the preservation of Arizona history in museums, libraries, and archives. For decades Rosenbaum worked to have a new, modern building constructed

to house the Arizona State Archives. In 2001 legislation was passed to construct a new archive building and to name it to honor long-time legislator, Polly Rosenbaum. But construction was delayed for years by budget problems. The Friends of Arizona Archives (FAZA) members and other supporters worked for more than ten years to get the building funded and constructed. On Oct 16 we celebrated a preview opening of the new Archives building at 19 Ave near Jackson. The new Polly Rosenbaum Archives and History Building will be formally dedicated Jan 15, 2009. Unfortunately, current budget cutbacks have reduced the funds for interior furniture, shelving and equipment. Funds are being raised now. Your contribution is greatly appreciated. 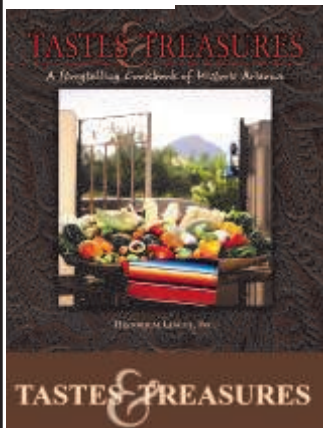


Tastes & Treasures A Storytelling Cookbook of Historic Arizona

Good news ... the reprinted books have arrived at the Museum.

Kay Holcombe and Ruth McLeod went to Nashville in September for FRP's two day Cookbook University. Our book was well received and many other attendees bought *Tastes & Treasures* to take home to show their cookbook committees.
